

Olashore signs MoU with the Institute of Education in Ireland

lashore International School will begin to admit students for a pre-medical foundation programme from October 2016. This is following the signing of an agreement to run a pre-medical foundation programme with the Institute of Education, Dublin, Ireland. The agreement will allow students to spend the first year of their pre-medical foundation in Olashore before progressing to Ireland and taking up places at leading Irish medical schools including the Royal College of Surgeons and Trinity College, Ireland.

Protecting yourself from Lassa fever

DR. ALEXANDRA ADEYEMI SPEAKS ON THE LASSA FEVER THAT HAS HIT MANY STATES IN NIGERIA AND EXPLAINS HOW WE CAN PROTECT OURSELVES AND OUR LOVED ONES...

The Lassa fever outbreak has affected over eight states including Lagos, Edo, Rivers, Niger, Kano and Oyo. Despite the recent outbreak, Lassa fever is not new in this part of the world. It was first discovered in the 1950s, however, the virus causing Lassa fever was not identified until 1969 by Christian health workers in Lassa town in present Borno State of Nigeria from where the disease derives its name. It is endemic in West Africa and subsequent outbreaks have occurred in Nigeria, Liberia, and Sierra Leone since it was first discovered.

Transmission Symptoms Treatment

Lassa fever is a Zoonotic disease. meaning that humans become infected from contact with infected animals. These rats naturally live in bushes around human homes and visit such homes in search of food or during bush burning in an attempt to escape the fires. This species of rat, when infected with Lassa virus, does not become ill but can shed the virus in its urine and faeces. Ingestion of contaminated food or other edibles infects humans. In areas where such rats are a source of food, exposure to the infected rat's blood and ingestion of its meat increase risk of infection. Lassa virus may also be spread from human to human through direct contact with blood urine, faeces and other bodily secretions from an infected person. Person to person transmission can occur both in community and healthcare settings where proper sanitary measures are not employed.

The disease occurs in all age groups and both sexes. People at the greatest risk are those living in poor sanitary conditions. The incubation period, which is the time it takes for the disease to manifest and show its different symptoms, is usually from 6-21 days following which an acute illness with multi organ involvement occurs. Non specific symptoms include high fever, headache, sore throat, cough, abdominal pain, vomiting, continuous diarrhoea or constipation. In severe cases, bleeding from the gums and internal organs which may lead to shock and death may occur. Clinically, Lassa fever infections are difficult to distinguish from other viral haemorrhagic fevers like Ebola and Marburg and from more common feverish illnesses like malaria, shigellosis or typhoid.


Ribavirin is still the drug of choice and is efficient if administered as soon as the first signs occur. Antibiotics may be administered to treat or ward off secondary and opportunistic infections. There is currently no effective prophylaxis against the disease but some recommend ribavirin for people who have come in contact with high risk patients.

Prevention

There is no vaccine available consequently people should cover their food properly whether cooked or uncooked. Also maintain adequate personal hygiene with frequent hand washing. The surroundings should be kept clean and refuse disposed properly to keep rats away. In addition, one must wear protective covering when in contact with infected persons and report symptoms immediately to the nearest health centre.

IT'S YOUR LIFE TO LEAD





Nuclear Generation Engineer Uzodhu Michael

Uzodhu Michael, an alumnus who currently works as a Nuclear Generation Engineer with EDF Energy, one of the largest energy companies in the UK, speaks about life after Olashore International School...

AS A STUDENT OF OIS, WHAT WERE SOME OF THE ACTIVITIES YOU WERE INVOLVED IN?

During my time in OIS, I tried to maximise my opportunities, getting involved in as many activities as I could. Most of these were team activities such as debates, quizzes and some sports like football, handball and field hockey to mention a few.

HOW HAS YOUR TRAINING IN OIS HELPED YOU PROFESSIONALLY AND OTHERWISE?

Looking back, I consider OIS a stepping stone to greater heights; academically and professionally. My habit of engaging in daily postlecture studies whilst at university, and now post-work personal development stem from 'prep' sessions at OIS. The importance of planning at the start of the day and reviewing at the end cannot be over-emphasized. OIS also provided opportunities to vie for leadership positions thus improving my social, communication, team-working and interpersonal skills.

I was the Events Coordinator and later the Treasurer for the African Caribbean Society at the University of Manchester. This is evidence that the training I received many years ago has helped me through different stages, and continues to help me.

WHAT WERE SOME OF YOUR MEMORABLE MOMENTS IN OIS?

Although all my time at OIS was memorable, I think the most memorable were the beginning and the end. I remember the first day, like it was yesterday. It was the beginning of a new chapter in life. Far away from home in Port-



Harcourt, I made new friends, and benefitted from the diverse culture at OIS. The memories of the final days are of mixed feelings. Studying for the most difficult exams as at the time, having to leave friends were difficult issues I was faced with at the time. A positive mindset, embedded in me during my time at the school, helped me through this. Luckily, we are in a rapidly technologically advancing world hence, most of us

are still in touch irrespective of our locations.

HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR STAY IN OIS?

In one word, magnificent! One may not have thought so whilst at the School, but like the popular saying by Joni Mitchell; "Don't it always seem to go, that you don't know what you've got till it's gone." I miss the staff (academic and non-academic) and students. We were like a family!

I'M SURE YOU HAVE HEARD ABOUT SOME OF THE RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN OIS, WHAT IS YOUR TAKE ON THESE?

I think the school has progressed

massively from where it was as at the time I left. Some of the recent developments that I have heard of are the refurbishment of the dormitories, integration of iPads into the learning structure and more importantly, the Systematic Leadership Programme which I hear is different from the programme traditionally organised for prefects. Speaking to a member of staff, I was told that the school identifies its students as potential leaders of tomorrow and deems it necessary to develop such qualities. This is good for the students of the school, the local community and the nation at large, looking at the bigger picture.

SINCE GRADUATION, WHAT HAVE YOU BEEN UP TO?

Graduating in 2009, I went to the UK to study at Oswestry School, where I did my A-Levels, and then to obtain my MEng (Hons) in Electrical and Electronics Engineering at the University of Manchester. I am a member of the Institute of Engineering and Technology, currently working towards attaining a chartered status. I have also been involved in a few businesses and investments whilst at university, and after graduation.

HOW HAS THE EXPERIENCE WORKING WITH ONE OF THE LARGEST ENERGY COMPANIES BEEN LIKE?

Haha! It has definitely been very exciting. It is amazing working with brilliant minds producing about one-fifth (20%) of the UK's electricity and supplying around 5 million residential and business accounts with electricity or gas. What would be more amazing, is contributing to solving the power problems in my home country, Nigeria.

This being said, working with such a company has made me more politically, security, and environmentally conscious as we work collectively to secure the UK's energy future.

I have also been opportune to work within different business units across the company which aids to fix the puzzle, if you may like, as to how such a massive organisation functions.

YOU WORK AS A NUCLEAR GENERATION ENGINEER, WHAT DOES THIS ENTAIL?

The most important thing it entails is

a high nuclear safety culture. As a Nuclear Generation Engineer, I am part of the workforce that operates the power stations that produce electricity. This goes directly into the National Grid to be transmitted throughout the UK.

The generation process in the simplest terms is using nuclear fuel as a heat source to boil water which then produces steam to turn the turbines that turn the generator. The electricity voltage that is then generated is 'steppedup' for transmission by the National Grid.

WHO ARE YOUR ROLE MODELS?

I admire certain characteristics in my dad and as such would call him my role model.

DESCRIBE YOUR TYPICAL DAY?

In the broad sense, my typical day would be proffering engineering solutions. This in some cases would involve taking a nonengineering perspective such as its financial viability, emergency preparations, legal and regulatory framework, etc.

WHAT IS THE MOST IMPORTANT ADVICE YOU EVER RECEIVED?

The most important advice I have ever received was from my mum. She always says: "Remain focused, so you can make a nation where there is none."

WHAT DRIVES YOU?

There are a few things: challenge, commerciality, sustainability,

professionalism and most importantly, 'the bigger picture'.

WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS FOR THE FUTURE?

Nonetheless, I am ambitious, and as such have many plans for the future which I hope would come together enabling me achieve the overall goal which is to impact in the lives of as many people as I can: directly or indirectly. I hope to play key roles within the private sector nationally and internationally, and at some stage, possibly be involved in public administration.

HAVING EXCELLED AS A HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT, WHAT WILL BE YOUR ADVICE TO STUDENTS?

I would advise current students to always think of the bigger picture. It is only when you know where you want to get to, and where you are coming from, that you can come up with a plan on how to reach your destination.
